NOTICE that the top and left hand columns are outlined in heavier lines. These are the common ancestor or common progenitor and his descendants.

Following column one (1) from both sides of the chart you will find that they cross on the "B" square showing that the children of the common progenitor are brothers or sisters. Follow column two (2) from both sides of the chart and note that they cross on the "1C" square so the grandsons of the common progenitor are first cousins.


In trying to determine the degree of relationship between distant relatives after determining that Sam is five generations removed from the common progenitor and Harry is seven generations removed from the common progenitor, follow column five on one side of the chart and column seven on the other side until they cross and you will see Sam and Harry are 4C2R or fourth cousins twice removed.



## Tracing Your Ancestors

1985

### Starting the Search

"Tracing" or researching family history is an interesting pastime. If you are of Irish extraction you may wish to learn a little more of your family history. Indeed you may plan to visit the traditional homestead or seek out living relatives. To be successful, it is important to make preparations in your own country before visiting Ireland. An important factor in establishing a link with Ireland is the date and place of arrival of your ancestor in your home country. Many agencies and organisations will assist you in this aspect. For example, in the United States, the National Archive contains many useful records. It is often possible to trace from them the family's American history back to the port and date of arrival. Immigrant records and shipping lists indicate the country, trade and age of the immigrant and the port of departure. In Canada, the provincial records record births, deaths and marriages which again should be consulted.

Australia is particularly well endowed with civil records because State involvement was a factor in a high proportion of emigrants arriving there. A series of "assisted passages schemes" was operated in addition to the 19th-century practice of deporting large numbers of people - often for very minor infractions of the law. The National Library of Canberra has indexed many of the records while in Sydney the Mitchell Library also has valuable records.

In your initial researches however, often the most valuable information is that gleaned from family sources. Living relatives, family papers or traditions can be very important. Wherever possible, verify family tradition and items spoken about by old people.

By these various methods, seek to build up as complete a picture as you can of the ancestors who left Ireland - surname, Christian name(s), profession or occupation, their religion and the part or county of Ireland from which they came. An aid here is the tradition of emigrants naming their American homes after the parish or townland from which they came.

### Main Irish Archives and Libraries

Dublin City is the location for all of Ireland's centralised genealogical records. While some non-Catholic marriages are recorded from 1845 onwards, registration of births, deaths and marriages generally, commenced in 1864. These records are held by the *Registrar General* and housed in Joyce House, 8/11 Lombard Street East, Dublin 2 Tel (01) 711000

**Fees:** A limited search - confined to five years - costs 75p, a general search IRE10.00 when conducted in person.

The *National Library*, Kildare Street, houses a major collection of genealogical material. An extensive range of trade directories - particularly for the 19th century - can be consulted, as well as journals of local historical and archaeological societies, published topographical and local histories and some newspapers.

The library also has a microfilm section. This contains an extensive collection of parish records, for births and marriages.

A manuscript section includes deeds, letters, rentals and other papers relating to many



The library also has an extensive indexing system which enables the searcher to identify the material he needs to consult.

The *Public Record Office*, Four Courts, Dublin suffered severely in a fire in 1922. Many valuable source documents were lost. Despite this, numerous records, rich in genealogical interest, remain. These include Griffith's Primary Valuation of Ireland, dated 1848, which records the names of all those owning land or property in Ireland at that time. The Tithe Applotment books of the 1820's/'30's, although not as comprehensive, do list the names of people whose holdings were subject to tithes (church payments). Indexes to wills, administrations, licence and wedding bonds can be consulted. However, the actual documents to which these indexes relate were, in many cases, destroyed in the fire of 1922.

The earliest National Census, now extant, is that of 1901.

The *Genealogical Office*, which incorporates the Office of the Chief Herald and the State Heraldic Museum, will be transferred to larger premises at 2 Kildare Street, Dublin 2, in the spring of 1985. Pending reopening of the office to the public, enquiries relating to heraldry, genealogy and associated matters should be addressed to the Chief Herald, Genealogical Office, 65 Earl Court, Adelaide Road, Dublin 2.

In each of the above establishments, arrangements can be made for research to be carried out on your behalf for a fee.

Other centres, likely to prove of interest to the determined researcher are: *Land Registry Office*, Ely Place, Dublin where records enable the researcher to trace the ownership of specific land from the present day to 1850. *Register of Deeds*, Henrietta Street, Dublin 1. Its records date from 1708 and relate to all the usual transactions affecting property, notably leases, mortgages and settlements.

The *State Paper Office*, Dublin Castle, housing records of the former Chief Secretary's Office. Among several series of interest to the

relating to the period 1798; crime and convict records and details of those sentenced to transportation.

If your emigrant ancestor came from Northern Ireland - Antrim, Armagh, Down, Derry, Tyrone or Fermanagh - the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland, 66 Balmoral Avenue, Belfast BT9 6YN, tel. 661621 will be able to assist. The Tithe Applotment Books and many records for these counties are housed here.

### Local Records

Birth, death and marriage records are also held at county level, relating to the county in question only, and again dating from 1864. Church records vary widely in age but, on average, date from the 1830's with many examples significantly older. Because of the large number of parishes, it is usually necessary to have successfully identified the parish before worthwhile progress can be made. Records are in the care of the parish priest.

Several Church of Ireland Parochial Registers were destroyed in 1922. Those that survived are kept by the incumbents of parishes throughout the country. Many date to the 18th century with some even older.

Presbyterian enquirers are referred to the Presbyterian Historical Society, Church House, Fisherwick Place, Belfast 1. The Society itself holds a number of registers and can usually provide information on others still retained by local ministers.

Local libraries are also worth consulting. Most contain fact sheets, giving details of books and documents of local genealogical interest. Ask if there is a local historic or genealogical society, some of which have undertaken the task of recording memorials of the dead.

The erecting of headstones or tombstones was not prevalent before the middle of the 18th century. Sometimes they can provide names and details not available from any other source. Their value to the genealogist has been recognised by the activities of the "Society for the Preservation of the Memorials of the Dead"

eland's archives are constantly being researched and the task of cataloguing and indexing continues. This will enable more source material to be readily accessible and enhance still further your chances of succeeding.

A 'family tree' by definition, is the record of the male ancestry through seven generations. This ideal is very difficult to attain but the task itself is rewarding, absorbing and almost always crowned with some measure of success.

The Irish Genealogical Research Society publishes a journal twice a year entitled the "Irish Genealogist". The Honorary Secretary is Mr. F. B. Payton, Glenholme, High Oakham Road, Mansfield, Notts., England. Annual subscription is Stg. £6.00 (US \$14 dollars).

#### Local Societies

Many local historical or archaeological societies around the country have among their members keen local genealogists who may well assist with local enquiries. The Federations of Local History Societies, Chairman, Very Rev. Father Sean O'Doherty, St. Luke's Hospital, Kilkenny will, on request, supply the name of the society acting in the county of interest. 

Groseclose was back in left. Erie's catcher was little Frankie Pytlak, who later played with Cleveland and Boston.





The Bureau requires a fee of seven dollars to prepare a certified copy of a death record. If Mrs. Johnson died in Lakewood, Ohio, however, you can write directly to the Health Department in that municipality, in care of the City of Lakewood, 12650 Detroit Avenue, Lakewood, Ohio 44107, to request a search for Mrs. Johnson's death record.

I am a retired, 66 year old, printing paper salesman. My wife Grace and I have two children. James attended both Case-Western Reserve and MIT. He is a computer engineer living in Texas. My daughter Patricia lives in Erie, she and her husband Arthur have two daughters Lisa and Laura.

I am enclosing<sup>2</sup> information about my grandfather's brother William. I did not know he died in Erie.

To track him down is the part I like best about family history. To start I assumed he was Catholic and checked the Catholic Cemetery. They had a William Hawkins, buried in 1911, no stone and nothing on the card file. I next checked with Brugger's Funeral Home as they did most of the Catholic burials about that time. They had no record of him, but they gave me the names of two other funeral homes that may have buried him. They had nothing. As a last resort (having the date he was buried) I went to the public library and got the micro film of both papers for that date and the results are enclosed.

I owe you an apology! After I received your letter about Miriam Julia's birth, I decided to recheck the micro-film (#1026185) fortunately it was still there. You were right, she was born April 7, 1882 and baptised on April 16, 1882--Witnesses (God-Parents) Patrick Donohue & Mary Hawkins.

This from a film of St. Bridget's Church records, Meadville, Pa.

I also checked the list of deaths and owners of plots in St. B. Bridget's Cemetery--no Hawkins family listed. Under marriages I did find that Michael and Mary Liddy were married on May 2, 1881--Witnesses John O'Connell and Julia Sullivan.

These records are poorly written and in Latin so they are hard to read and translate. This will be my excuse for the wrong birth date for Julia--Sorry

My Grandfather could have been John's Godfather I'm not sure but he did receive an announcement when John graduated from St. Mary's School in Conneaut, Ohio.


